



Home Learning Grid - Nursery -Week 7&8

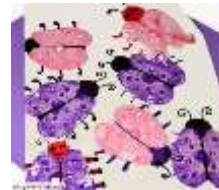
Communication, Language & Literacy

The Bad Tempered Ladybird was very grouchy. Talk to a grown up about the things that make you feel grouchy, sad or unhappy sometimes.



Expressive Arts & Design

Can you create a picture of a ladybird? You could use half an apple and red paint to stamp the body. Then add a head, eyes and antennae. How many legs does a ladybird have?



Understanding the World

Ice cube painting
Add some food colouring or paint into water and freeze into ice cubes. Don't forget to add a stick or straw before freezing. When it is solid, you can use to create your own rainbow. How long does it take for the ice cubes to melt?



Understanding the World

Use a collection of sticks, twigs and leaves to make a bug hotel in your garden. Keep checking to see what minibeasts are living there. You might see a ladybird.



Physical Development

Fine motor skills – cutting
Can you make a rainbow person? Use a toilet roll, draw on a face and colour on some rainbow hair. Then use the scissors to snip the top of the tube to create the strands of hair.



Expressive Arts & Design

Can you make a ladybird model?
You could use playdough or salt dough (this has to be baked) then paint it.

The Bad tempered Ladybird and Little Red Riding Hood are both characters that like red. Can you draw a picture of your own book character? What is their favourite colour?

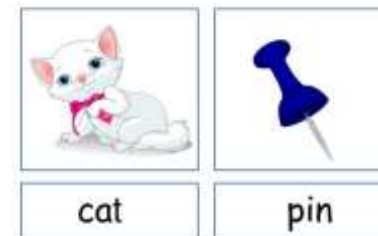
Extension- can you write the name of your character and describe some of their features.

e.g mop, tin, dog



Maths-shape

Can you make a clock using a circle, 2 rectangles and 2 triangles. Write the numbers 1-12 on it. Practise making and telling the time for o'clock. The ladybird visited a different animal every hour.



Maths-number

Can you make 10 ladybirds, each with a different number of spots from 1-10. Then draw some leaves with the numerals 1-10 on them and then match your ladybirds to the correct leaves.



Maths-Measures

How many socks long are you?

Lie down and ask someone to place socks along the length of your body. How many socks long are you?

Extension-

Can you measure all of the members of your family?
